

Incentive Drug List

Effective January 15, 2015

The Incentive Drug List is used in combination with the PacificSource Drug List for large employer groups. The drugs listed below are available for the incentive copay shown on your policy or pharmacy summary of benefits. These incentive drugs are alternatives to Tier 2 or 3 copay drugs. This is a partial list of covered drugs, and includes only those offered at the incentive copay rate. A full list of covered drugs can be found on our website at PacificSource.com/drug-list.

If you are taking a drug for a chronic condition and the drug is not listed below, consider asking your doctor about switching to one of these incentive alternatives to reduce your out-of-pocket costs. Show your PacificSource ID card each time you purchase prescriptions at a participating pharmacy to ensure you're receiving the best benefit.

Please note: Some health plans may only provide coverage for certain drugs on this list. A separate benefit may apply to some drugs, such as specialty drugs. Please refer to your member benefit handbook for pharmacy benefit details. This list is subject to change as new drugs enter the market.

Unless otherwise noted, incentive drugs are limited to short-acting drugs. Long-acting drugs, transdermal patches, suspensions, compounds, and injectable drugs are not typically on the Incentive Drug List.
